The Steinbeis Innovation gGmbH – Innovation Centre “European Projects” is an institution of the Steinbeis-Foundation which was founded by the Federal State of Baden-Württemberg in Germany. Within the European Solidarity Corps (ESC) Program the Steinbeis Innovation gGmbH is accredited as a coordinating and supporting organisation (OID: E10206422), for hosting volunteers it co-operates with several institutions of the german social and health care system, e.g. the St. Martin Nursing Home in Löffingen.

Germany has a long tradition of national voluntary service programs (e.g. FSJ, BFD) and a lot of young people are joining these programs for professional orientation whereas facilities and institutions of the social and health care system are using these programs for recruitment of future staff.

Volunteering in health and social care facilities offers young people an orientation and a preparation for a vocational training in the field of nursing.

For young people from abroad there is the opportunity to join the ESC voluntary service, which provides in addition to the german programs also language and intercultural training.

What volunteers can expect:

As a young person without professional experience, you can get a taste of a professional field and find out whether you would like to work in this field in the future.

The nursing profession is a profession with a future. There is a great need for qualified carers. Particularly in the care and assistance for the elderly, there is a shortage of qualified staff, which threatens to cover the need for care places.



Benefits for ESC volunteers:

Participation in the European Solidarity Corps is free of charge for participants. Except for a possible contribution to travel costs, the participant must not be charged, neither fully or partially, nor directly or indirectly, for taking part in a European Solidarity Corps activity.

- travel costs from home to the venue of the project and back will be covered
- free board and lodging
- pocket money (210 €/month)
- two consecutive free days per week (unless arranged differently in mutual agreement)
- two days of holiday per month of service
- complementary coverage of the European Health Insurance Card (EHIC)
- language training by a qualified trainer
- all participants will receive a European Solidarity Corps certificate of participation

Some information about the hosting organization:

The St. Martin nursing home for the elderly in Löffingen offers 50 care places. It is situated in a quiet, sunny location near the town center. The nursing home is run by the Löffingen Hospital Fund, a legally independent foundation whose board of trustees is made up of the Löffingen town council. The chairman is the mayor of the municipality of Löffingen.





Löffingen is a picturesque small town in the Black Forest-Baar district of Baden-Württemberg. It is located on a plateau in the Upper Black Forest, surrounded by dense forests and green meadows.





In addition to a wide range of leisure activities, Löffingen offers cultural events and a family-friendly infrastructure.

Some information about the location:

With its historic old town, which boasts lovingly restored half-timbered houses and narrow alleyways, Löffingen exudes a special charm.



The town is known for its proximity to the impressive Wutach Gorge, a paradise for hikers and nature lovers.



What you can expect in the St. Martin Nursing Home:

Volunteers are given a single room in a shared flat together with other volunteers, trainees, interns etc. in a separate part of the nursing home.

In order to maintain contact with their home country, volunteers are provided with internet access. This can be either WLAN access in the house for their own internet-enabled device or the use of a house PC with internet access.

A television is also available in a common room.

Volunteers can take part in the communal catering in the house, for days off they receive a meal allowance or can come to the dining room for meals.



In addition:

ESC volunteers receive a D-Ticket, which allows to travel easily and flexibly throughout Germany - whether by bus, train, tram or S-Bahn! It is valid for all public transport, from your home town to the coolest cities, festivals or to visit friends across the country (not valid in high speed trains like IC/ICE/EC!).



Spontaneous trips to the lake or hikes in the mountains are also easy. With the Deutschlandticket, leisure time becomes an adventure - just hop on and go!

Tasks of the volunteers:

Volunteers can co-design important tasks using their own creativity.

Volunteers should bring their own ideas to create and lead support activities for the residents. The St. Martin workers welcome personal ambition from the volunteers. The workers give support to the volunteers for planning and running activities.

Values of our work, which should be followed by European Volunteers:

- To accept elderly people together with their own individual characters
- To assist elderly people in difficult times of their lives
- To support and work together with all the organization workers
- Be true to the organization and act responsibly in line with the organization's purpose
- Be ready to use imagination and to accept change

Some exemplary volunteer activities:

- Playing board games together with residents
- Reading aloud from newspapers or books
- Providing support at mealtimes by keeping company
- Having simple conversations and listening



- Regular visits to individual residents
- Small errands within the home
- Accompaniment to events in the home
- Liaising between residents during joint activities
- Support in maintaining contact with other residents

Support with group activities:

- Assistance with handicrafts and creative activities
- Assistance with gymnastics and movement exercises
- Participation in singing groups
- Support with seasonal celebrations
- Accompanying the residents' groups on excursions



The volunteers encourage and promote the independence of those in need of care. They learn to develop tolerance for the individual circumstances of those in need of care. They help with food preparation and follow-up and assist with shopping and housekeeping from an economic and environmentally conscious point of view.

Through their work, the volunteers can

- make a valuable contribution to everyday life in the home
- gain insights into geriatric care
- get an orientation into the field of nursing
- gain intercultural experience
- improve language skills
- develop social skills

What comes next?

Voluntary service thus enables many young adults to familiarise themselves with the world of work and get used to it, in a sense a 'first contact' with professional work, which can serve to specify individual plans for the future. In any case, volunteering activities make it easier to make decisions about training, study and career choices.



Your job with a future - geriatric care!

Do you want a job that is not only in demand, but also really makes a difference? Geriatric carers are the heroes of tomorrow! In an ageing society, you are indispensable - a job with 100% job security. You don't just work with people, you work for people and see every day how important your support is.



Whether with further training, exciting specialisations or the opportunity to pursue a career - all doors are open to you in geriatric care. Start in a profession that makes sense and has a future! Get involved, change lives and shape the future of care!

Desired profile of volunteers:

Our projects are outlined for young people with less opportunities in terms of education, therefore we don't accept graduates (Bachelor/Master) or students from university.

We prefer young people without university entrance qualification who might be interested to start a vocational training in Germany after the voluntary service.

Volunteers should be interested in working in the social and health care sector and be open to working with elderly and/or disabled people and people at risk of exclusion.

Volunteers should be able to develop and plan activities on their own initiative, but also be able to contribute innovatively and collaborate within the team.

A basic knowledge of German would be helpful and a willingness to learn German is expected.

A class B driver's license would be helpful

We expect a long term participation (min. 10 months) because the persons cared for in a nursing home need stable personal relationships, therefore it's not possible to change the volunteers frequently.

How to apply?

Since in the ESC program volunteers need a supporting organisation in their home country they should first look for a suitable organisation in the database on the internet:

After reviewing the documents, we invite suitable applicants to a video interview in which the responsible persons from the sending organization, the host organization and the project coordinator participate alongside the applicant.

The final decision on the admission of the applicant is made jointly by the coordinator and the host organization.
